Semester - IX :

In the 9th Semester the students will have to study 3 Theory Courses/Papers (2 Compulsory + 1 Optional) and 01 Practical also. There are two optional papers out of which the students have to choose only one paper. Besides that they have to complete 01 Major Research Project. The Practical and Major Research Project are compulsory and each course is of 4 credit.

Semester - X :

In the 10th Semester there are two separate groups (A/B) of 03 papers each, out of which the students have to opt only one group. There will be 01 Practical and 01 Major Research Project which are compulsory and each Course / Paper is of 4 credit.

Note : Nature of Research Project may be either Individual/ Determinate (Project to be completed in only 9th Semester) or Progressive / Indeterminate (to be started in the beginning of 9th Semester and to be completed at the end of 10th Semester). In case of Research Project to be Individual the Project of each Semester will be of 4 credits, whose combined evaluation will be done at the end of the year, (4+4 = 8 Credits). In case of Research Project to be Progressive it will be evaluated at the end of the year whose total credit will be 8.
